





Repetition, Repetition, Repetition

- If you are new to paper piecing, select a pattern that provides lots of repetition
- Repetition creates muscle memory



Tiny Piecing

- Once you have mastered the technique, move on to patterns with smaller piecing
- Learn to pre-cut fabric for minimal wastage
- FPP Quilt Math!




Angles, Angles, Angles

- FPP patterns often give the illusion of being multi-dimensional and piecing often has angles
- Calculating the fabric for these pieces can be challenging
- Lining up critical matching points is key






Quilt Math




Sample Block


- Measure the width and height of the pattern section
- Add ¾" to each measurement
- This allows a minimum of ¾" fabric for the seam allowances








Cut fabric based on measurements



Place fabric in order of sewing



Let's Start Sewing

Supplies


- 70/10 needle
- FPP paper
- Add-a-Quarter Ruler
- Add-an-Eighth Ruler
- Glue Stick
- Seam Roller or Small Iron
- Postcard or Cardstock
- Wonder Clips
- The Usual Suspects*



^{*} Usual Suspects: rotary cutter, cutting mat, ruler, seam ripper, sewing machine, thread

The First Piece


- Rough cut about ½" around pattern
- Place a spot of glue on the wrong side of the pattern at the first piece (A1)






The First Piece


- Glue the wrong side of the fabric to the wrong side of the pattern
- Make sure the fabric extends at least ¼" around the A1 outline



Fold

- Line up the cardstock against the A1 and A2 stitching line
- Fold the pattern over the cardstock





Trim


- Place the
 Add-a-Quarter
 ruler against the
 pattern/cardstock
- Trim the excess
 A1 fabric






Align

- Align the A2 fabric along the edge of the A1 fabric
- Make sure the A2 fabric extends ¼"
 on either side of the A1-A2 stitching
 line



Stitch

- Flip pattern over to the printed side carefully holding the fabric in place on the reverse side
- Stitch along the A1 and A2 line using a small stitch (1.50)
- Backstitch at the beginning and end of the stitching line




Press

- Flip the pattern over to the fabric side
- Press the fabric

Printing the Pattern

- ❖ Locate the 1" measurement block on your pattern
- Print a test page of the pattern
- Measure the 1" block to confirm your printer actually prints at 1"
- ❖ Do not print from a browser; download the pattern and then print
- Browsers sometimes skew the print dimensions... you may not get a true 1"
- Use paper specifically designed for paper piecing
 - ➤ I use Carol Doak paper, as I find standard copy paper to be too thick

Before You Stitch

- Rough cut pattern piece leaving final cutting line visible
- Set stitch length at 1.50; this makes for easier perforations
- Use a lightbox to help in fabric placement, especially if fussy cutting fabric to fit in pattern piece
- ❖ Watch how you place the first piece of fabric; the right side should face out
- Use a spot of glue on the first piece
 - I don't use pins, although some tutorials tell you to pin the fabric to the paper, I find that pins distort the fabric

Finishing

- On larger pieces, place a running stitch in the seam allowance
- Follow pattern directions on pressing seams; some patterns require seams to be pressed open
 - I use a small stick iron with no steam
 - Be careful when pressing so the printer ink does not transfer through to the fabric
- When removing paper, work from the outside in towards the middle
 - I try to fold the paper creating an easy tear line
 - I remove the papers only on the sections that are seamed, but wait until the entire block is complete to remove the remaining papers




